The Plan (A)

- Consolidate MLK and Bayside to one campus (K-8) creating a strong professional learning community and school climate (Timeline Fall 2013) OR
- Two K-5 (Bayside/WCA) and one 6-8 (MLK)
- Pursue Bond Funding (Nov 2012) for modernization, deferred maintenance, additional classrooms and facilities to create two balanced campuses for the district
- Cost approximately 20 million (10/10 each campus)





- Pursue other financing to add classrooms and playground/field upgrade to MLK – continue to plan K-8 community schools model with A team
